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Lessons Learned from Managing Mega-Shelters: A case study of shelter operations from two flood events in Binghamton, New York

In 2006 and again in 2011 Binghamton University opened its doors to the community following devastating regional flooding. In both instances, Binghamton University cared for over 2,000 evacuees from the community who were displaced from their homes with nothing more than the clothes on their back and a few possessions. The shelter operation was divided into two separate functions: a general population shelter and a functional medical needs shelter. Each operation had unique challenges requiring creative solutions. This presentation will highlight the challenges of operating a mega-shelter and will focus on lessons-learned from the perspective of the shelter manager.
