A U.S. Air Force veteran, Vanessa has led planning and response operations for incidents ranging from natural disasters to aircraft incidents, with a deep focus on victim and family support services.

Most recently, Vanessa has pioneered the development of Institution of Higher Education (IHE)-specific Friends and Relatives Center (FRC) and Family Assistance Center (FAC) plans and resources, as well as an EM-specific Mass Violence Incident (MVI) checklist designed to streamline activation and response. This innovative approach includes the creation of a FAC board game—used to train staff through interactive scenario-based learning—demonstrating a commitment to practical, scalable solutions that strengthen preparedness across diverse environments.
