Tracks, Interest Areas, or Random Choices?

The Conference Committee is sometimes asked why we don't have "Tracks" for the event. We understand that some people want a clear path for their sector or industry. But we believe that EM is Everything and Everything IS EM.

Our goal is to bring top-quality presentations that apply lessons and concepts broadly to the field. We hope our academics will attend health sessions; health will attend utility; utility will attend response to incident; responders will attend finance. Need I go on? Of course not, you're pros!

To be helpful, we added interest areas to the agenda. How do we decide what interest to list? Well, first we use our conference theme. But then we read EVERY comment from conference evaluations. If we see an interest area requested but not well represented, we may recruit presentation submittals that fit. Our biggest challenge is that we can't control what is submitted.

In 2018, evaluations clearly showed that incidents and lessons learned are of great importance (62 total respondents, #1 answer). In addition, those sessions also illustrate leadership and collaboration.

So, if you have an interest in a topic area, you can submit to speak or recruiting people that you would like to see "take the stage" at one of our break-out sessions. If the topic area has a wide appeal to emergency managers, and presents information in a new, informative way, they have a good shot at being selected. That is, of course, if they rank well by the committee and follow instructions.

We receive hundreds of submittals and can only select about sixty. Maybe yours will be one of them!

Paul Johnson has been the Director of the Douglas County Emergency Management Agency in Omaha, Nebraska for thirteen years. During the Spring of 2019, the Midwest experienced unprecedented flooding due to record snowfall and rain. In Nebraska, there were overflowing rivers, levees

and dams, forced evacuations, record damages, injuries and deaths. During his plenary session, at the 67th IAEM Conference in Savannah, he will discuss the response and recovery to the devastating floods and the impact it had on the Douglas County community.

Mr. Johnson has been integral in reorganizing and establishing new approaches for government entities to successfully respond to and recovery from community emergencies and natural disasters. By utilizing a scenario-based approach to planning, training and exercising, pre-disaster decision-making has become better defined and response options have been expanded and clarified. He was a co-author of the **Emergency Response Planning Guidelines Handbook™** and has served as the IAEM Region VII Vice President and a member of the IAEM Standards and Practices Committee.

Mr. Johnson has a Bachelor of Science from Iowa State University and a Master of Science from the University of Central Missouri. He is a retired Colonel from the Iowa Air National Guard working a Bioenvironmental Engineer. In his spare time, he is an active commercial hot-air balloon pilot.
