Heroes, Helpers & Hope - From New York to New Zealand and Beyond...

The Origins of the Waffle House Index, or How I Came to Love the Private Sector

Disasters don't hit governments, they hit communities, where the private sector provides the majority of goods and services. Why then, do we often exclude the Private Sector from the EM team? From my personal "Lessons Learned" in past disasters, I've determined government centric problem solving, while efficient in smaller events, does not scale well in larger disasters. We will start with the Waffle House Index and provide additional examples of how working with the private sector enhances response and recovery.

NextGen EM and Communication: Challenges and Innovation

Covering current best practices and trends in emergency management worldwide and how the rapidly evolving digital world and emerging technologies are impacting EM organizations, this talk will look at how Next Generation EM organizations will need to adapt and what skillsets are going to be required in an ever more complex and interconnected world. Going hand in hand with that is the growing challenge for the public sector to better respond to and integrate social media and other channels of communication into their operations – before, during and after an incident. The public is demanding more responsive communications from government as well as a role in sharing information during response and recovery. Everything from AI to drones to greater integration of the private sector and increased soft skills are part of NextGen EM.

Leaving a Legacy

Chad inspires, motivates, and moves audiences, creating an experience that touches hearts for a lifetime. He is one of the youngest ever to receive the Council of Peers Award for Excellence (CPAE) and to be inducted into the prestigious National Speaker Hall of Fame.

In 2001, at the age of 27, Chad's life changed in an instant when a 2,000-pound bale of hay shattered his neck, leaving him a quadriplegic, but Chad's dreams were not paralyzed that day—he became an example of what is possible.
