### On-site Effective Communication Resources

#### **Biden Administration**

- -Cal OES/FEMA pilot to provide vax to underserved communities
- -2 mega sites
- -Creating the blueprint that will be used to roll sites out nationwide

#### Onsite Physical and programmatic accessibility

- In-person ASL interpreters/All staff have VRI
- In-person Language (Spanish, Vietnamese, Korean, Tagalog, Mandarin and Cantonese)
- Free paratransit and Free shuttles to/from bus/train stops
- Dedicated paratransit lane
- Direct input from the Pacific ADA Center on accessibility (Fact Sheet & Checklist)
- ADA compliant restrooms, handwashing stations, isolation areas if unable to wear a face covering/mask
- Manual wheelchairs to/from site stations and chairs with and without armrests
- Temperature controlled tents

#### Mobile sites (two per site)

- Sent out to CBOs (M-F and S-S)
- Working with partners to identify locations (ILCs)

#### **MyTurn**

- We've been providing CBO codes for prioritization
- Will be dispensing individual codes moving forward
- All jurisdictions will use MyTurn
- The site is accessible, available in 6 languages

### Pandemic Response for Persons with Disabilities

#### Past disability and health COVID efforts:

- Coordinated conference calls with statewide disability partners to anticipate, identify and meet PWD needs
- ✓ ADA Coordinators and CILs identified and address any accessibility issues at state COVID testing sites
- ✓ Collaborated with Feeding Florida and CILs to deliver food to CIL clients and other PWD across the state
- ✓ Distributed clear masks and 3D-printed face shields to CILs, school districts, home health agencies and other organizations to prevent the spread of COVID-19 among PWD
- Secured certified American Sign Language (ASL) interpreters for FEMA vaccine hub and spoke sites



### Pandemic Response for Persons with Disabilities

### **Current Disability and Health Efforts:**

- ✓ Establishing CIL partners as vaccine sites for their clients with disabilities
- Developing and sharing accessible COVID messages with PWD and disability partners
- ✓ ADA Coordinators and CILs identifying and addressing any accessibility issues at FEMA and state vaccine sites
- ✓ Providing sensory backpacks to all four FEMA Vaccine Hub sites to provide sensory items to assist persons with I/DD or autism getting their vaccine



### Pandemic Response for Persons with Disabilities

### Future Disability and Health COVID Efforts:


- Develop autism-friendly vaccine sites
- Expand on-site vaccine clinics to all CILs across the state
- Provide disability etiquette and awareness training to new vaccine clinic staff
- Develop more ASL videos on COVID vaccine efforts for deaf and hard of hearing community



### <u>Centers for Independent Living</u> (CILs)Collaboration

- ✓ In March 2020, CIL representatives activated at the State EOC as part of the State Emergency Response Team with ESF-6
- ✓ FDEM provided CILs with sterilized durable medical equipment and PPE.
- ✓ In February 2021, CILs were approved as a vaccine site by DOH and FDEM to reach vulnerable populations
- ✓ Developing and sharing accessible COVID messages with PWD and disability partners
- ✓ CIL staff provided disability etiquette training to FEMA Vaccine site staff
- CILs also identified individuals that are homebound and notified DOH and FDEM.

### COVID-19 and Disability Vaccine Information



**Social Story**: Infographic using plain language to educate PWD about COVID and the need for the vaccine.

Designed for persons with intellectual or developmental disabilities.

<u>First Panel</u>: Shows need for vaccine and the vaccine process.



### COVID-19 and Disability Vaccine Information



They will tell you if you need another shot to stay healthy.



You might need to come back in 3 or 4 weeks for a second shot, and . . .



You will go through the same steps with the second shot.



When they tell me I am okay, I go home.



I might have a red spot from the shot. My arm might be sore. I might feel tired, have a headache or fever.



After a day, if my arm is still red and sore, and I still feel sick. . .



I can call my doctor.



Or I can call the COVID-19 Call Center, 1-866-779-6121, and press 3 for help.



After a couple of days, I will feel fine.



### 3 Pillars of Accessibility:

- Effective Communication Access
- Programmatic Access
- Physical Access



Like a 3-legged stool, each pillar supports the other pillars

### **Effective Communication Access**

- Addressing best practices and gaps in access to 9-1-1 and other emergency notifications, including people who are deafblind.

### **Programmatic Access**

- COVID Protocols Maintained During Response to Simultaneous Disasters
  - Non-congregate shelters in motels used instead of high school gymnasiums in accordance with face covering and social distancing mandates
- September Wildfires After Action Report
  - Received several requests from American Red Cross to assist survivors in Central/Eastern Washington in replacing mobility equipment and housing lost during the wildfires.
- Pandemic Exposed Highlights and Gaps in Access and Functional Needs during Response
  - Timely access to critical information about vaccinations in languages other than English
  - · Barriers to online registration sites for vaccinations
  - Technology and policy barriers in virtual conferencing technologies used for online work, school, medical, and social gatherings
  - Lack of internet access due to location and affordability



### **Physical Access**

- CARES Act funding for Centers for Independent Living for: PPE, rent/food assistance, affordable and accessible housing, mental health Monday's, addressing isolation through virtual programs, etc.
- ADA assessments for DOH and local shelters and vaccination sites
- Increasing capacity for AFN expertise in state and local emergency response plans.
- More awareness and participation by PWD in emergency preparedness



### Current WASILC/CIEP Network Efforts Addressing Systemic Changes

- Elevate disability voice to the larger community since COVID disproportionately affected the disability community
- Increased partnerships and collaboration between disability advocacy organizations and state agencies such as DOH, EMD, and other agencies
- All in WA grants to local CBO's to get vaccine information out to disability, LEP, and BIPOC communities
- Equitable vaccine distribution for people that:
  - cannot leave their homes or wait long in line for vaccinations
  - don't have access to technology
  - have difficulties navigating the system


