

 The Act specifically directs the Secretary of the DHS to provide a separate classification and method for small businesses (SBRP)



Small Business Recognition Program

Self Declaration of Conformity

A process by which participating small businesses can demonstrate that they have successfully implemented a business continuity management system and provide formal verification to its conformity



Purpose of the Program

To formally recognize small businesses for achievements in continuity management, resilience and preparedness through a self-declaration system



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



Disaster Planning Can Reduce Time to Recovery and Expense.

Major disasters, such as earthquakes and large-scale power outages, are rare. Smaller disasters, such as server failure, burst pipes and fires however happen every day. Companies often prepare for the worst but forget the everyday challenges, which can be just as crippling.

When disaster strikes, having a plan and being able to put it into immediate action can mean the difference between staying open to service the needs of your customers and community or shutting down for a few days.

Following a disaster, statistics show ninety percent of companies fail within a year unless they can resume operations within five days. Having a plan can ensure that you're back in business quickly and able to provide products and services to your community.

Assessor Qualifications

Assessors will be selected by IAEM according to their ability to meet the mandatory qualifications, willingness to voluntarily participate, and availability.

Mandatory Qualifications

- Candidate demonstrates personal integrity and professionalism
- BCM certification (BCI: FBCI, MBCI, SBCI; DRII: CFCP, CBCP, MBCP)
- 5 years' working experience as a business continuity practitioner
- Familiarity, knowledge and understanding of preparedness maturity models (which may be acquired up until Pilot Study begins)


