Benefits of the National Qualification System

Presentation Abstract:

Are you looking for a way to qualify your personnel? Do you ever wonder where to

start? Over time, FEMA has learned that catastrophic disasters can quickly

overwhelm jurisdictions and the disaster workforce supporting the community.

Findings in after-action reports, such as the Cascadia Subduction Zone Exercise,

demonstrate that region-wide staffing and resource shortages occur frequently.

The 2017 hurricane season proved to be another example of how the emergency

management community needs to build additional capabilities and resources for

responding to incidents. In response to the rising problem, FEMA is developing the

National Qualification System (NQS), which aims to operationalize resource-sharing

opportunities for disasters and incidents by creating an agile disaster workforce

that is well equipped, educated, and trained to rapidly mobilize, deploy, and

conduct missions. NQS provides the tools for jurisdictions and organizations to

implement their own qualification and certification processes to share resources

more seamlessly with other jurisdictions and organizations.

NQS enhances mutual aid. By speaking with one voice, entities can:

1. Rapidly identify personnel who have the needed qualifications for the job;

2. Supplement their team with confidence knowing that the mutual aid they

receive consists of the capabilities for which they asked;

3. Efficiently define staffing requirements; and

4. Clarify recruitment and training requirements.

NQS also supports the National Preparedness Goal by creating a network of qualified personnel for potential nationwide deployment.
