- Training sessions, workshops, community surveys and preparedness events, enhancing public outreach.




Strengthen Emergency Plans

Bringing It All Together


- Two day community resilience conference.

Impact

- Creating preparedness material and making it customizable and shareable.
- Developing a new Regional Resiliency Website and enhancements to current KnoWhat2Do website.

- Enhancing traditional communication (flyers, brochures with QR codes, libraries, water bill inserts, shopping centers, etc.).
- 4 Regional Catastrophic Grant Team personnel enhance local emergency management capacity by helping with community events and being a force multiplier.
- Helping establish community relationships.
- Developing and conducting training to the community such as CPR, Stop the Bleed, Fire Extinquisher, etc.

Addressing Identified Preparedness Gaps

- General lack of public education and awareness about emergency management and hazards.
- Language access and bilingual personnel for outreach.
- Geographic size.
- Rural vs. urban area needs differ (e.g. connectivity, access, messaging, etc.).
- Lack of formal preparedness education for employees and residents.
- Low community turnout.
